

MS3 Perspective on Rotations During COVID-19

As a medical student, you spend the first two years of medical school preparing, planning, and longing for the day you finally put into practice everything you have learned. Third-year medical students are usually purposed to gain the necessary professional expertise as they look forward to exercising their profession through solving different health-related challenges. The COVID-19 pandemic has been a massive setback to medical practitioners worldwide. Even medical students experienced significant challenges in their academic exercises. While doctors, residents, nurses, and other health care workers battling at the front lines had a definite purpose of helping fight the pandemic, medical students, on the other hand, faced another problem. Our medical rotations were put on hold, and suddenly, medical students became more of a liability than help in the field. Furthermore, once rotations were green-lighted, concerns about fulfilling the academic requirements arose. The shortage of personal protective equipment (PPE), the inability to allow students to scrub into surgical cases, and the forced limitations placed on patient interaction would affect our medical education. Thus, living this "new clerkship experience" was intimidating and stressful, for all of us mainly because of the uncertainty we were facing.

At first, it felt as if medical students had been left in the dark; no in-person lectures, no group studying, and limited patient encounters deemed as if our medical education was being compromised. It was hard having to sit back and not be helpful during a global medical emergency, but staying grounded and not letting the pandemic consume us was exactly what we needed to do. During my first rotation, in internal medicine, I had the opportunity to interview patients filled with anxiety and fear of the COVID-19 virus. As a medical student, I was able to provide relief to many of these patients by giving them reliable information about the virus and transmitting hope and reassurance that practicing social distancing and following the guidelines placed by the CDC would help flatten the curve sooner. Likewise, a few months later, during my family medicine rotation, I had patients experiencing similar feelings but this time about the COVID-19 vaccine. I felt it was my duty to offer them reliable resources and information so they could make an educated decision, about whether to get it or not. The counseling I provided in both situations was ironically derived from the same perspective I gained as I went through my third-year medical school rotations. I had to keep in mind that we may not be the ones providing direct care for COVID-19 patients, we all had important roles to play. Besides, our time will come soon enough. In the meantime, the best thing I could do was maintain a positive mindset and acknowledge that this was

temporary, and we just had to get through it the best way possible.

Today, I can say that I am satisfied with my medical education this year. Even though the pandemic affected us in many ways, I feel gratified that I contributed to providing health care to patients in a time of need. Thankfully, our clerkships became more flexible with time, and we were allowed to perform procedures and interact more with patients. I want to thank all of the attendings and clerkship directors for providing us with other ways to gain our medical knowledge this year. Last but not least, I'd also like to thank and congratulate my classmates from the SJB MD Class of 2022 for the social and emotional support I received from them during this year. May we never forget how hard times can make us stronger together and more passionate about our careers.

SJBSM PUERTO RICO HEALTH JUSTICE CENTER UPDATE

The Puerto Rico Health Justice Center (PRHJC) is a comprehensive clinical forensic service for participants who have experienced sexual violence. It provides psychosocial screening, forensic interviews and evaluations, psychiatric and psychological assessments, forensic medical exams, therapy, court preparation, interdisciplinary-interagency case discussions, and expert testimony. Added to these services, the PRHJC has other projects such as a 24/7 Helpline and Court Watch.

During 2020 PRHJC obtained a total of more than \$2,000,000 in service grants. Since its onset, December 2015, the Center has serviced 538 victims of sexual violence, from disclosure to the case's closure. The different services provided by a multidisciplinary team of more than 20 expert professionals provide unique clinical experience and a database with multiple possibilities for research. This year PRHJC will have three vehicles for clinical services with the capacity for videotaped forensic interviews, virtual therapy, and forensic

colposcopy medical exams, one with a wheelchair and shower capacity.

Research is a priority in the PRHJC. The Research Division provides orientation and support for research regarding violence as a health issue. Presently there are six research projects in development as a result of the active participation of Dr. Linda Laras and Dr. Linda Pérez in the mentoring of medical students MS 2023 during their summer research internship: Profile of male child sexual abuse victims by Edgardo Torres; Sleep disturbances among victims of sexual violence by Andrea Rosa; Pediatric knowledge regarding child sexual abuse by Luisandrea Morales; Health-related behaviors among people in PR during COVID19 by Shania Aponte; Cooking as therapy for stress relief among professionals caring for sexual violence victims by Gabrielle Rivera, Raphael Rivera, Eileen Calo. Dr. Linda Pérez is also developing a new research project entitled "Cardiovascular risk factors in victims of child sexual abuse in Puerto Rico."

IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON THE 2020 SUMMER SJBSM RESEARCH

Since the inception of the required summer research experience, the SJBSM medical students could apply and compete for a position at SJBSM or other prestigious research summer programs across Puerto Rico, the USA, and other countries. This 'hands-on' summer research experience allows students to develop, conduct, and manage a research study providing students the opportunity to acquire biomedical, clinical, epidemiologic, and translational research skills.

By late March 2020, MD 2023 students began to receive cancellation letters due to COVID 19 until all in-person research rotations locally and in the USA were canceled by the end of April. SJBSM's curriculum committee decided not to cancel the 2020 Summer Research Internship and revise the activities consonant to a **virtual research experience**. The internship research objectives and competencies remained without any alteration. Once all students had mentors, the 2020 Summer Research Internship officially started in June 2020. The **radical changes** observed were going from almost 60% of the SJBSM medical students doing their summer research internship in an institution outside of Puerto Rico during 2014-2019 to only 9 % (n=5) in 2020 and from

presential laboratory to virtual experiences.

Each mentor chose the research topic (s) and the Internship's starting date to comply with the minimum requirement of 100 hours in no less than four (4) weeks and no more than eight (8) weeks. Nevertheless, the students have the choice to continue working with each respective mentor during the academic year to accomplish their goals. The Internship's requirement also remained the same: an oral presentation about their research project. The mentor/mentee research activity emphasis continued to be the same as previous years: producing a scholarly outcome by the end of the academic year, such as an abstract for an oral or poster presentation, develop a publication, or a research proposal.

This experience was the first time that all research activities for the summer internship were virtual. The medical students worked at a distance with their mentors in scientific writing and creativity. The expected outcomes include developing research proposals, case studies, reviews, communications, workshops, and even a book chapter. It will be remarkably interesting to compare this virtual research experience's outcomes with the previous years' scholarly outcomes.


COVID-19 VACCINATION CLINIC

ENDOTHELIN-1 STIMULATES MICROGLIA CELLS: ROLE IN MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS

This research project's main findings suggest a novel ET-1 pathway for activation of microglia cell inflammatory responses that may provide essential information critical for our understanding of multiple sclerosis (MS) pathophysiology. Several students worked actively in this research project under the mentorship of Dr. Yaritza Inostroza, pictured here.

The project was presented by Claudia Arenas, MS3 at the ACTRIMS Forum 2020, in West Palm Beach, Florida, on February 27-29, 2020. ACTRIMS Scientific Program Committee awarded her an Educational Travel Grant. THE 4TH INTERDISCIPLINARY RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM

The 4th Interdisciplinary Research Symposium, organized by the San Juan Bautista School of Medicine and the Latino Student Medical Association, was an exciting opportunity to integrate multiple academic levels, disciplines, and institutions. The Symposium was celebrated at the SJBSM facilities at Caguas, on Thursday, February 20, 2020, with more than 150 attendees. In summary, this 4th Interdisciplinary Research Symposium achieved its goal: "to join different disciplines and medicine to work together towards achieving better health and equity through team research."

The Symposium had two poster sessions with a total of **60 scientific presentations** in the categories of clinical, basic, and behavioral sciences. The discussions during the posters were enthusiastic and provided multiple opportunities for networking and collaboration. SJBSM had 20 poster presentations and 40 posters distributed among nine local academic institutions. After the poster sessions, we were delighted to welcome Dr. Marcia Cruz -Correa, who delivered a motivating Plenary Conference entitled: "Precision Medicine and Hereditary Cancer: Novel Pathways in Clinical & Translational Research".

All posters were carefully evaluated by faculty using evaluation criteria that would allow the difficult task of selecting **first and second positions in the three poster categories**. The recognitions were given to the presenters at the closing of the event as follows:


